As we all finish school for the holidays, we thought we would take a look at the different ways Team BBG will be celebrating Christmas.

Miss Roumelioti is looking forward to returning to her home country of Cyprus for Christmas in the sunshine.

Christmas in Cyprus is mainly a religious festival, and Cypriots go to church every day from Christmas Eve until New Year's Day. On 25th December, families will get together to celebrate with a special meal (usually cooked outside on a barbecue). The meal consists of turkey stuffed with liver, dates, raisins, chestnuts and rice, eaten with Greek salads.

Saint Basil delivers presents on New Year's Eve, but tradition states that goblins visit houses to try to steal the presents. In order to distract the goblins and keep them occupied while Santa is delivering, Cypriot children throw melomakarona (special cakes) onto the rooves of their houses! This seems to work, and children open their presents on New Year's Day.

Miss Roumelioti's Giagia (grandma) bakes a special new year's cake called vasilopita, topped with nuts which spell out the year. Inside the cake is a coin, and whoever gets the coin in their piece gets good luck for the year ahead.



Mariia, one of our Ukrainian students, is looking forward to spending her first Christmas in the UK. She tells us that in Ukraine, every town has a ten metre Christmas tree, and everyone from the town takes toys and ornaments to decorate it. Like in Cyprus, 25th December is mainly a religious celebration, and the main family event is on New Year's Day. At midnight on New Year's Eve, Grandfather Frost (Ded Maroz) visits the children to bring them presents. He is dressed in a long red or blue coat with a fur trim, with a long white beard and carrying a long staff, and riding on a troika (a sleigh).

New Year's Day is spent with family. As Ukraine is such a diverse country, families celebrate in different ways. Some more traditional families eat a meal of 12 dishes, to signify the 12 disciples. Less traditional families celebrate with a meal of meat and vegetables and enjoy spending the day together.

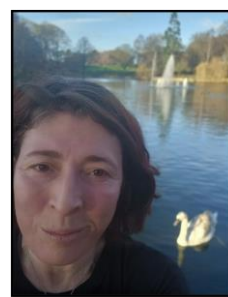
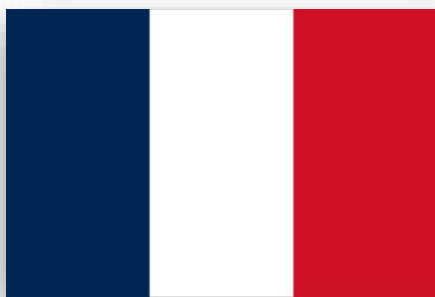
CHRISTMAS

Madame Djoković will be returning to France for the Christmas period, and is looking forward to a traditional French Christmas. In France Christmas is a great time for eating and drinking. The traditional Christmas meal consists of oysters, foie-gras, vegetables and salads, salmon, chapon (a white chicken), and of course is followed by the traditional Bouche de Noel (the yule log). This is accompanied by vodka sorbet and champagne.

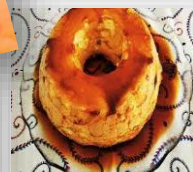
Christmas presents in France are mainly reserved for the children. At midnight, after midnight mass, there will be a knock at the door or on the windows, and the children will rush to look for Père de Noël. He, of course, will be nowhere to be seen, but while the children are searching for him, he sneaks into the house and leaves presents. Christmas day itself is spent with family, often playing board games together, and the following day is spent recovering from the rich food and drink.



Maja and Pola Kacprzak were both born in Poland, and moved to the UK in primary school. This year they will be celebrating Christmas in Poland for the first time in a few years. Their Christmas celebrations begin in the afternoon of 24th December, when they will go to church. When they return they will eat their main Christmas meal, which consists of bigos (stew), Borsch (beetroot soup) and fish. Before they eat they will say prayers and read from the bible. They will pass around opłatek, which is a kind of wafer, and as they do this, they give their good wishes to each other.

Whilst the family are at church for midnight mass, Święty Mikołaj (Saint Nicholas) will visit their houses and bring presents. On 25th December the family will spend the day together.

Anna, Paula and Yelena, three of our BBG colleagues, moved to the UK from Portugal. The Christmas celebrations in Portugal involve lots and lots of food! They start with a meal of cod, potatoes, cabbage and roast turkey on Christmas Eve. Whilst the family are at church at midnight, Pai Natal (Father Christmas) visits and brings presents for the children. On Christmas day, there is yet more food. The meat of a young animal (either a lamb, a kid or a suckling pig) is eaten, along with cabbage, potatoes and black pudding. And there are LOTS of desserts on offer too! The most popular is "tronco de nata", the Christmas log, but there is often also bolo rei (king cake), rabanados (French toast), sonhos de nata (Christmas dream), molotof, torta de laranja and coscoroes to choose from too!

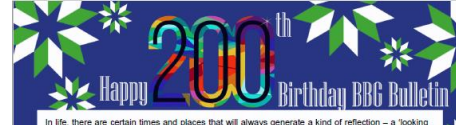

We have heard about Beau. She is five years old, and she lives in the local community. She has a rare condition called Neuroblastoma. Even though she received a heart-breaking diagnosis, Beau is an amazing fighter who lights up everyone's day effortlessly. Despite the fact that she is so young, Beau has a very brave attitude towards her condition, such as:

The final results were three wins and one loss, leaving the Yorkshire team in second place overall.

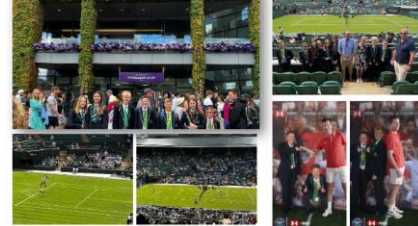

Aspire

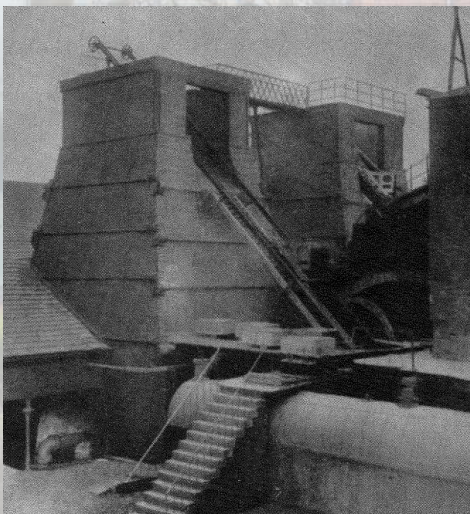
One of the very best parts of being in a Trust is the ability to develop the curriculum and share good practice. This year we have introduced the Aspire curriculum into Year 7. This curriculum builds on the Quaglia Institute's aspiration research. This research encourages students to become dreamers and doers and works under three principles:

- Self-worth
- Engagement
- Purpose

This term we have been working on self-worth and as part of that we have been learning about our community in order to foster a sense of belonging at both BBG and within the local area.

As we have reported over the last two weeks, we have been learning about the history of Birkenhead and some of the influential people that helped Birkenhead become the place it is today. This week we would like to focus on the Emmet Family.

John Emmet was responsible for the first large-scale industry in Birkenhead. In 1780, he and three other businessmen from Halifax, took over the lease on the land just off Bradford Road, near to the Methodist Church, and built a furnace and a foundry. This was the first iron foundry in this part of the country, and they made pots, pans, hearth grates, clock weights and kettles, among other things. To the left of where the foundry was, you can see Blue Hills farm. This was where the waste rock was tipped after the iron had been removed for it, and as the rock was blue in colour, it gave its name to Blue Hills. To transport the waste, Emmet built a canal which was a mile long. The canal boats were pulled by horses. At the bottom of the hill is a beck where you still see the remains of the waterwheel, which was used to power the ironworks.

Charles Dickens, arguably, is one of the best authors of the 19th century, beside Jane Austen, Edgar Allen Poe, the Bronte sisters (Although I am not acquainted with their novels, I know how influential they have been) and more amazing authors – and, of course, Mary Shelley, whose book, *Frankenstein*, is one of my favourite works of literature.

But what, exactly, made Charles Dickens such a great author? Of course, there are many reasons for this – the first, and most obvious, being the number of superlative novels he wrote.

In fact, you can be well acquainted with and able to fully understand Dickens' writing style just by reading one of his novels, and I would say that an accessible entry point into his works, for beginners, would be *A Christmas Carol*. It doesn't have too many difficult words in it, I'd say ('Apoplectic opulence' is about as befuddling as it gets and, no, I *still* have no idea what that means, even after searching on the internet.), and is a fairly digestible read, at only 125 pages or so – if you read at a fairly brisk pace, you could finish it in an evening, and I thoroughly encourage you to do so.

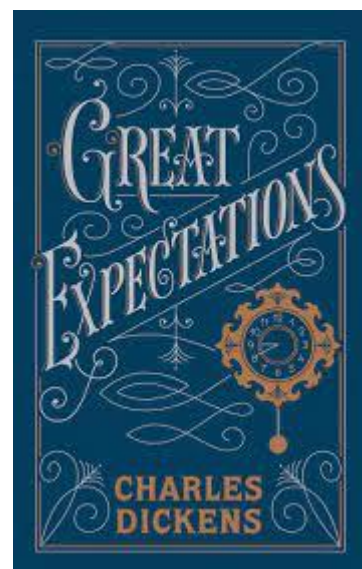
Now I am going to list his major works and explain why they were so influential. Starting off with his novel of which I am most knowledgeable...

Great Expectations

This is, for many, Dickens' best novel – it follows a boy, born into a working class family, named Pip, in the 19th century, (working as an apprentice in a forge with his sister's husband) who, upon being sent to a mysterious woman's house for work (Miss Havisham) and falling in love with her 'insulting' adopted daughter, Estella, becomes ashamed of his family and social class and vies to become a 'gentleman' (Or, rather, a middle-class boy).

Strangely, right after he starts to meet Miss Havisham on a weekly basis, a mysterious benefactor, who is later revealed, gives him 'Great Expectations' - wealth and social standing – he becomes a 'gentleman'.

After that, we follow the boy's coming-of-age story, you might say, as he grows up from a young boy to a man of about thirty years. It takes a dark turn towards the end, but its quality never falters, its characters never become less realistic nor less entertaining - Miss Havisham certainly never stops being a melodramatic yet darkly humourous character - and the story *never* stops being a page-turner.

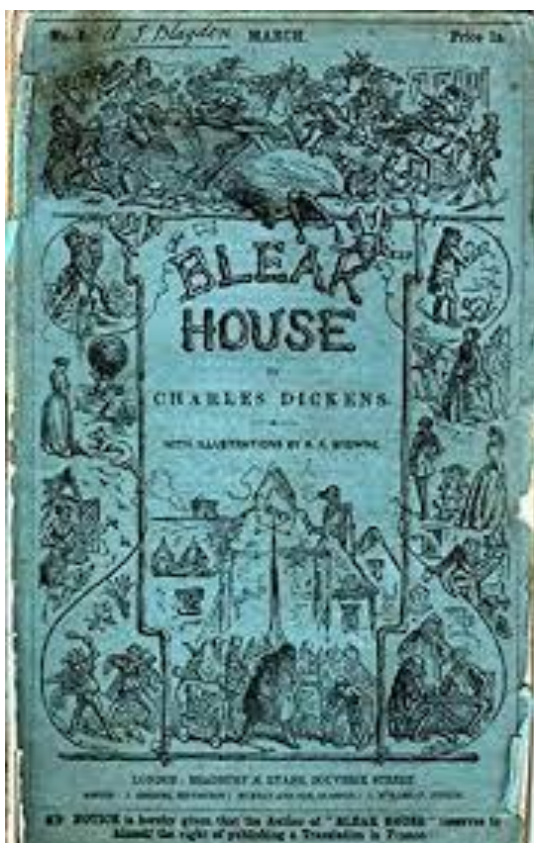

A Christmas Carol

Perhaps his most iconic novel (Although it is, to be specific, a novella), *A Christmas Carol* has been adapted into several different films and truncated and made more accessible for children in abridged versions of the novel. I am sure many of you know the story of *A Christmas Carol*, especially the Year 10s, who are studying it right now – quick tip: in analysis, don't just repeat what the author (Or your teacher) has said – you'll reach a higher level of understanding if you dissect the quotes yourself and find your own interpretation of them; pick out key words from the quotes and explain their effect on the reader.

It follows a cantankerous old man called Ebenezer Scrooge who, on a joyful (or, to him, miserable) Christmas seven years after his business partner's death, he is visited not only by the spirit of his partner, who he didn't mourn whatsoever, and three other spirits: *The Ghost of Christmas Past*, *The Ghost of Christmas Present* and *The Ghost of Christmas Yet To Come* – upon seeing his solitary child self, his temporarily happy adult self

(happy until he was left by his girlfriend, or wife - I am not sure - although she would say that he had left her for his pursuit of wealth, which was exactly the case.) and his deceased future self, he changes drastically as a character, doing everything in his power to make others' Christmas better and to redeem himself before his formerly inevitable death.



Bleak House

This novel is difficult. It is the novel of his I have read most recently, and I could only read one chapter before I capitulated to the confusing subject matter, frequent use of difficult to understand, archaic vocabulary and, overall, the size of the novel.

But not for long.
I will not give up.
I will not give in.

I will read *Bleak House*, dictionary at my side as I do so, concentrating and taking notes on events or subjects that confuse me! I will read *Bleak House!* After I have finished reading *A Christmas Carol*, *1984*, *Pride and Prejudice*, *War and Peace* and all the books on my ever-accumulating reserve pile in the library, of course.

Sadly, I have no time left to write about his other novels, but as soon as I do, I'll tell you about them. Thank you!

Year 7 History: The Bayeux Tapestry



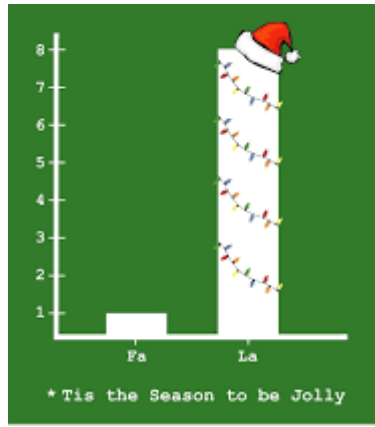

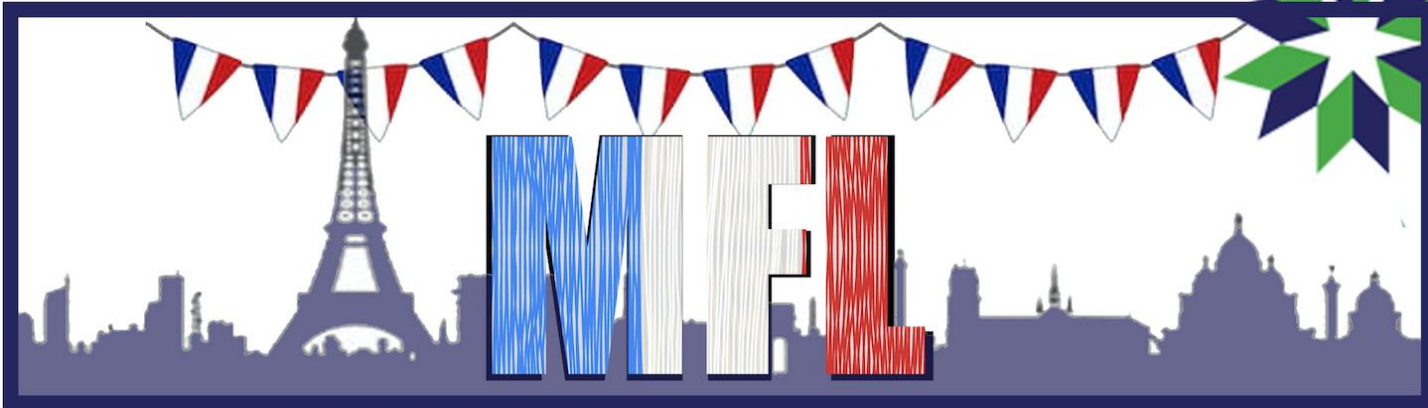

Let's celebrate: the BAGUETTE (the WAND in English)

UNESCO added the baguette to its "intangible cultural heritage" list in 2022. It has added "artisanal know-how and culture of baguette bread" to its list of 600 other items, joining things like traditional tea making in China – also included for the first time in 2022. Its inclusion "celebrates the French way of life", UNESCO chief Audrey Asoulay said, adding: "The baguette is a daily ritual, a structuring element of the meal, synonymous with sharing and conviviality. "It is important that these skills and social habits continue to exist in the future." **The humble baguette is a quintessentially French staple.** After all, the country is said to produce some 16 million a day.

Artisanal know-how and culture of baguette bread

The baguette is the most popular kind of bread enjoyed and consumed in France throughout the year. The traditional production process entails weighing and mixing the ingredients, kneading, fermentation, dividing, relaxing, manually shaping, second fermentation, marking the dough with shallow cuts (the baker's signature) and baking. Unlike other loaves, the baguette is made with only four ingredients (flour, water, salt and leaven and/or yeast) from which each baker obtains a unique product. Baguettes require specific knowledge and techniques: they are baked throughout the day in small batches and the outcomes vary according to the temperature and humidity. The production process is primarily transmitted through work-based training, combining school courses with work experience in a bakery. This apprenticeship enables future bakers to acquire the necessary knowledge of the ingredients, tools and process.

The exact provenance of the baguette is not known some suggest the bread was ordered by Napoleon because it would be easier for soldiers to carry, while others suggest it came along later - an easy bread for workers to tear and share without the need of a knife in Paris.

However, the baguette as we know it today was only officially named just over 100 years ago, in 1920. It was then that strict rules about what classed as a baguette were put in place - standardised at 80cm (30ins) and 250g (8oz). It even had a fixed price until 1986.

By the middle of the 20th Century, the baguette had triumphed over all the country. Today, the total number of artisanal bakeries across France has dropped from 55,000 to 35,000, according to news agency AFP.

And yet it remains key to French identity, with President Emmanuel Macron saying the baguette was "envied around the world". Mr Macron - who has long fought to get the baguette added to the list - noted after the announcement that the baguette was "250 grams of magic and perfection in our daily lives".

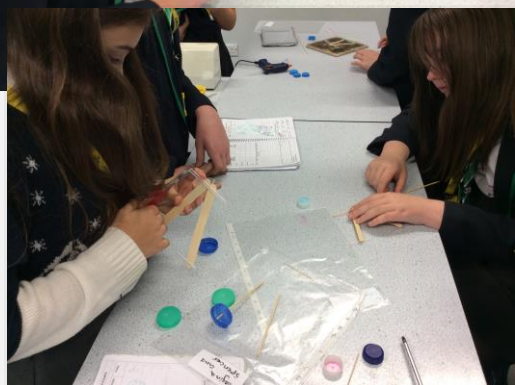
BBG SCIENCE

Learning through mistakes was high on the agenda as students tested and adapted their cars prior to the big finale.... A longest distance challenge!



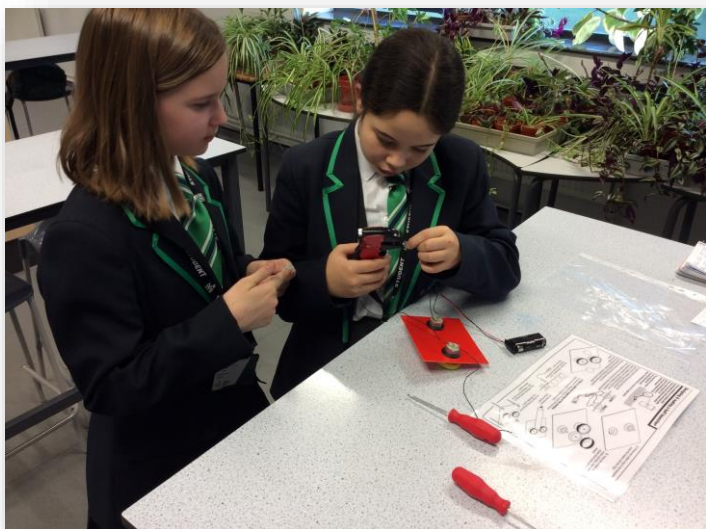
A massive well done to Charlie and Harrison, from 8Q2, who won! The boys worked phenomenally well together, as showcased in the image on the right.

The students in science club worked phenomenally hard over the course of 2 weeks, wiring, soldering and building their launchers with some fantastic final examples to take home.

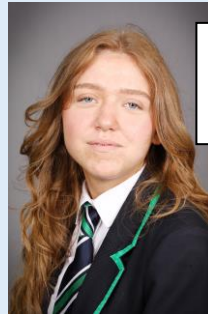

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particular around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at home with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our **Teen Sleep Hub**. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service.

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normally resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with over **17,000 downloads of the eBook**, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about SETTING UP APPS, GAMES AND SOFTWARE

Millions of new phones, tablets, laptops and games consoles will be nestling under Christmas trees this year. However, even if parents and carers have gone to the trouble of setting up these new devices and enabling the safety features, there are still potential hazards in the apps, games and software that children will want to install and use. Knowing what to look for and discussing those risks with your child may help avoid any nasty surprises this Christmas. Here are our top tips for ensuring that unwrapping this year's presents doesn't unleash any unexpected dangers.

TAKE NOTE OF AGE RATINGS

Back when most games were bought in shops, checking the age rating was easy: it was on the front of the box. Now that most games are downloaded, it's tougher – but not impossible. All reputable download stores show a game's age rating at the point of purchase, and you can check the suitability of a specific title your child wants to play at videostandards.org.uk/RatingBoard/games.

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'FREE' ISN'T ALWAYS FREE

The games market has changed radically in recent years. Many titles are free to download, but then tempt players to pay for cosmetic items (as in Fortnite) or to unlock additional content. There can be huge peer pressure for children to pay for these items. Agree a budget for in-game purchases before the game is downloaded, and make sure children can't authorise in-game purchases by themselves.

DISABLE IN-APP PURCHASING

It's not wise to leave children with devices that can make in-app purchases without your permission. Ideally, set up computers, consoles and phones so child accounts need an adult's authorisation to buy anything. On shared devices (like iPads, which don't allow user accounts), check the settings to ensure that in-app purchasing requires the account holder's password, fingerprint or face ID.

APPS ARE AGE RATED, TOO

Like games, apps in the major stores have age ratings, too – so you can see in advance whether an app's appropriate for your child. Additionally, phones' parental control settings allow you to set age limits, preventing young ones from downloading unsuitable apps themselves. These ratings aren't infallible, however: we've seen TV apps featuring adult shows with an age rating of 3, for example.

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CONSIDER STORAGE

Most apps and games will tell you in the online store how much space they need on a device. Check this carefully – especially with games, which can run into hundreds of megabytes and beyond. If you don't have enough free storage on a device to run the game or app, you won't get a refund from the store. You can normally check a device's available storage space through the settings menu.

WATCH OUT FOR IMITATORS

Even in the official stores, untrustworthy rogue apps can slip through the net. Common tricks are apps or games that have a slightly different name to the genuine article (Fortnight rather than Fortnite, for instance) or use logos which deliberately look very similar to the official app. To avoid downloading these imitations, read the app's description and check who the publisher is listed as.

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LEGAL APPS THAT BREAK THE LAW

There are many apps that are perfectly legal but enable illegal activity – streaming apps which let people watch football matches, say, without paying for Sky or BT Sport. Prosecution for using such apps is rare, but they can lead to risky behaviour like viewing rogue streams on sites teeming with malicious links. Watch for children installing unusual apps with 'TV', 'stream' or 'sport' in the name.

IN-APP REGISTRATION

It's common for apps and games to ask users to register: entering personal details like email address, date of birth and other information you might not want your child to divulge. Ask them to get your permission before giving any personal info to an app – and consider using your details rather than the child's, so they're not targeted by marketing spam or put at risk of having their data stolen.

STAY UPDATED

Most games and apps are subject to regular updates, which not only offer new content and features but also provide critical security improvements. Children tend to ignore such updates – usually because they don't understand why they're important, or they simply want to get straight on with gaming. Check your child's devices periodically to make sure these updates are being installed.
